

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the Astronomical Society of South Africa held at 35 Wale Street, Cape Town, on Wednesday, the 17th July 1927 at 8 pm.

The chair was taken by the President, Dr. H. Spencer Jones. There was a good attendance.

Minutes The minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the 28th July 1926, and of the General Meeting of the 8th June 1927 were each read & approved.

Annual Report The Secretary read the Council's Annual Report for the Session 1926-27: the adoption of the report was moved by Mr Cox, seconded by Mr Jackson, & agreed to.

Closing of Ballot At 8.30 pm. the chairman declared the ballot closed, and appointed Messrs De Kock & Skevers as scrutineers.

Financial Statement The Treasurer read the Audited Financial Statement for the year ended 30th June 1927, showing a balance in hand of £22.19.8; a further sum of £5 had since been received as a donation from the Natal Astronomical Association. The adoption of the statement was moved by Mr Cox, seconded by Mr Reid, and agreed to.

Reports of Observing Sections The Report of the Comet Section was read by the Director, Mr. W. Reid. He mentioned that eleven comets had been observed during the year, of which two new comets had been discovered by Mr Blatchley & himself. The Chairman expressed the Society's congratulations to Mr Reid.

The Report of the Mars Section (Director, Dr. J. M. Ross) was read by the Secretary. A number of drawings of the planet by members were circulated - generally conditions at the Cape had been unfavourable and the Chairman remarked that the seeing at Johannesburg was superior for planetary observations. He expressed the Society's thanks to Dr. Ross.

The Report of the Variable Star Section (Director, Mr. G. E. Norr) was read by Mr. Smith and showed that 3,400 observations

had been made by members during the session; this was a record figure. The Chairman referred to the importance of this work and urged the fast use of a telescope at the Royal Observatory to any member who wished to observe variables. The Society's thanks to Mr. Lupton were expressed.

President's Address

Dr. George Jones then delivered his Presidential Address on Stellar Evolution, showing the advances made in recent years in this branch of astronomy. The lecture was received with applause, and Mr. Long expressed the Society's appreciation and thanks.

*Amendment
of Constitution*
The Voting for the proposed amendment of the Constitution resulted as follows: In favour 32; Against 0, & the Chairman therefore declared the following amendment duly adopted: viz:-

Section (iii) of Article VII of the Constitution shall be amended to read as follows: the words to be added are in italics:—

"(iii). The Council shall meet at Headquarters. Any member of Council domiciled more than fifty miles from Headquarters or who otherwise has obtained the permission of the Council may, by notification in writing to the Secretary of the Society, appoint an elected member of the Society to be his alternate for the period of his office. In the event of his being able himself to attend any meeting of the Council his alternate may also attend, but shall not have a vote."

The Chairman welcomed Mr Jackson, a Johannesburg member of Council, who was present at the meeting.
