Report of Council for the Session 1970-1971.

Five Council meetings were held during the year, with a consistent average attendance of 12-14.

Membership as at 30th June 1971 totalled 353, of which 11 had been suspended through non-payment of subscriptions. In October approximately 50 members were in arrears, and although the majority did eventually pay, much unnecessary work for the Treasurer and payment of unnecessary postage would have been avoided if all members remitted their dues to the Society promptly at the beginning of the Society's year on 1st July. Last year's figures were 318 gross, with 14 suspensions.

MNASSA. During 1970-1971, MNASSA has been sent to approximately 150 subscribers in 26 countries, in addition to ASSA members. The list of subscribers includes almost every major astronomical institution. Since the start of 1971, airmail subscriptions have been made available to overseas members. It was pleasing to see that Sky and Telescope have recently given coverage to articles printed in MNASSA. Back Numbers from Volume 16 onwards, where out of stock, have been reprinted and are selling satisfactorily. Council is particularly indebted to Drs. Wild and Fairall, of the Astronomy Department of the University of Cape Town, for handling the despatch of Sky and Telescope and the Society's publications. This has relieved the Hon. Secretary of much work, for which he is more than grateful.

<u>Forbes Essay Competition</u>. A total number of 32 essays from 19 schools were received, being made up of 15 in the Senior Section and 17 in the Junior Section.

The subjects chosen for the competition were:

"Astronomy before the time of Galileo" in the Senior Section, and "My Holiday Trip to the Moon in 1984" in the Junior Section.

Names of prizewinners and comments by the adjudicators appear in a separate report.

Gill Medal. No proposal for an award was received.

McIntyre Award. No award was made.

Student Members. Council has been considering suggesting to Centres ways and means of encouraging this class of membership. There is the danger of the younger folk losing interest, and if this could be avoided, the Society would benefit, not only through an eventual transfer to full membership, but also by being stimulated through their youthful enthusiasm and perhaps new ideas.

Constitution. It has been the practice to issue a copy to all new members on joining. However, stocks have been exhausted, and the opportunity is being taken before a reprinting to examine the various Articles for any possible improvements. Any alterations proposed would be put to members for their decision.

Merlin Medal. Council was pleased to be informed of the very deserting award of this medal to Mr. J.C. Bennett of Pretoria by the British Astronomical Association.

<u>Jackson-Gwilt Medal</u>. Council was also pleased to be informed of the award of the Jackson-Gwilt Medal to Dr. A.W.J. Cousins of the Royal Observatory, Cape, by the Royal Astronomical Society.

S.A. Assoc. for the Advancement of Science. would be holding its annual congress in Durban from 5th July to 10th July. The Durban Centre was asked to send a representative on behalf of the Society. The person appointed is Mr. G. Hobson, with Mr. Booysen as a substitute should the need arise.

Miscellaneous. The year 1972 would see the 60th Anniversary of the Cape Astronomical Association and the 50th Anniversary of the Astronomical Society of Southern Africa. The question of suitably commemorating these two events are under consideration.

On behalf of the Society, Council was pleased to congratulate the Royal Observatory at the Cape on its 15oth Anniversary in October 1970. Copies of a commemorative booklet, issued by the Royal Observatory were purchased for distribution to Society members.
