Minutes

of previous meeting held 1975 November 25 were taken as read and signed.

Matters Arising

- (a) <u>Insurance on telescopes</u>. Mr Turk reported that cover had been arranged to June 1976, the end of the Society year at a cost of R15.15. The pro rata share due for refund from the Pietermaritzburg Centre was R3.30. The Richfield Telescope was on loan to the Comet and Meteor Section, and the insurance was a Society's liability. The 4" Laurence Refractor valued at R1 600, and whose insurance of R16 p.a. formed the greater part of the R23.50 p.a. insurance premium for all the equipment was at present in the "Atkins Dome" in the Cape Centre. It was not being put to any use and the Cape Centre therefore considered that a refund of a high continuing annual "pro rata" premium was not justified in the circumstances. The possibility of the University of Cape Town using the telescope was mentioned, and the matter was left in abeyance until June, the payment for the current term only being R10.31. Mr Turk was than ed for his part in finalising the matter of insurance.
- (b) Mr Lincoln. A letter received from Mr Muller of Bloemfontein was read. The reason for Mr Lincoln's resignation was stated as mardly financial, but rather psychological and poor health. Mr Muller proposed that 1) a communication from the Society, advising him that he would retain full membership on account of past services and advancing years, without further payment, would give him a "moral boost"; 2) that this privilege should extend to all members over 75 years of age who had made some contribution to the Society. 1) was agreed, 2) was left for consideration by the sub-committee, who were viewing the various Articles in the Constitution.
- (c) Mr Turk gave a brief resume on what was being done about the Constitution. He discussed the present Nomination Form and suggested that it be replaced by an Application Form, with provision for sponsers. Finality had not yet been reached, a further report would be made.

The balance in the Plusplan A/c with the Standard Bank, Heerengracht Branch is now R950-00, and the amount of R1000-00 is still on Fixed Deposit with the United Building Society at an interest rate of 10%.

The balance in the McIntyre Award A/c. is now R698-59, bond interest of R34-02 having been added during December 1975

Escalating costs were eating into the Society's reserve funds. Cost of Sky & Telescope and MNASSA to the end of the Society year would be round about the R2000 mark, plus the cost of despatch offset by odd receipts. The above statement shows reserves of only about R2000; the question of increasing receipts becomes a matter of urgency. Agreed that MNASSA should now cost individual subscribers R6 per annum. Those who had already paid for 1976 would only pay increased rate in 1977. Agreed that Council should consider increasing subscription from R8 p.a. to R10 p.a., which would bring in about an additional R1000 p.a.; noting that increases invariably resulted in some resignations. This would, on the present basis, barely balance expenditure if at all. There was a further proposal that the subscription should rise

to RI2 p.a., of which R2 would be earmarked for an emergency fund; for use meeting unexpected costs. These proposals would be considered again at the next Council Meeting, thereby giving all members of Council opportunity to consider the situation carefully and to instruct Alternates, where necessar with their viewpoints.

Handbook

An error resulted in the re-printing of 6 pages of the Handbook. Mr Hurly paid the sum involved vis R24 - and asked that the total cost of Handbooks be increased by this sum, with a contra entry of a donation of R24. It was regretted that reference to the Salisbury Centre was not made. The Handbook was printed just before the Printers' recess. Council thanked Mr Hurly for what was achieved over a difficult period. Centre Representatives on Council should note that details of office bearers should be notified as soon as possible after the Centre Annual General Meeting for incorporation in the Handbook. Any suggestions as to the composition of the Handbook would be welcomed.

had been awarded an honorary doctorate by the University of Cape Town. The Secretary was directed to convey Council's congratulations to him. It was noted that he would be in Cape Town for the investiture in June 1976, when arrangements would be made for members to meet him.

Miscellaneous

Mr. Hurly suggested that the Society should contact the Defence Department with a view to instructing army personnel in direction finding by astronomical means, when in difficulty in adverse surroundings. While recognizing that the Authorities would have adequate means of ascertaining positions in bush and unknown country, it was thought that a knowledge of the sky could possibly be of assistance to the odd person(s) stranded in difficulties. The Hon. Secretary was directed to write to the Department of Defence.

Mr. Turk raised the question of the resumption of the Essay Competition. This was left over for the next meeting.

The question of advertising was also raised, but no decision taken. Mr Duveen agreed to contact overseas firms advertising in the BAA Journal with a view to their using MNASSA for the same purpose. Council wished to place on record the sterling work done by Mr. Gray in Durban particularly in connection with his researches into the history of Astronomy in Natal.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 22h00.
