Firstly a huge thank you to Chris Stewart for his tireless work over his term as president, and for bringing ASSA to its 100 year anniversary.

In terms of my role at ASSA, I am of course honoured to be able to serve as the ASSA President. I actually got my start in astronomy at the now-defunct Pietermaritzburg Astronomy club where my father used to take me to the talks and stargazing events.

It was then that I started dreaming of a career in astronomy and I believe that's the incredible role ASSA can play.

It is stated in the ASSA goals that number 1 is the encouragement and stimulation of study in Astronomy.

As I got more involved in ASSA over the past couple of years I have realised how powerful the ASSA network is. It hosts incredible events, talks, publications such as the Sky Guide and MNASSA as well as contributions to astronomical research.

Astronomy is in a truly Golden Era, which telescopes such as JWST, SKA and LSST coming online and South Africa is at the forefront with the likes of SALT, MeerKAT and the SKA. We will also host the IAU General Assembly in 2024.
