2 SECTION REPORTS

2.1 2025 – 2026 Observing Evening Report Michael Poll

The Observing Evenings have been reasonably successful considering the weather and other circumstances. We normally averaged about a dozen attendees on the observing evenings that were held, which is more than last year's average, and in May we had a great turnout of about 40 people – fortunately for that evening the sky was clear and amongst other things, the Moon, Jupiter and Venus were well placed. We also had about twelve people on a cloudy evening in June, even though there was no observing. We usually had enough telescopes available.

With the light pollution the skies at CBC are much worse than in the past and intermittent cloud was a frequent problem - we had to cancel the November 2025 and April 2026 observing because of total cloud cover and cancel the April evening it was rained as well. The latter was called off at the last minute which was unfortunate, as there was no time to inform anyone.

Three members were regular attendees and were available to “host” the evenings – Johan Smit, Johan Jordaan and Michael Poll. In fact in August when none of these were available for one reason or another, we decided to cancel the Observing Evening.

Although we made quite a few telescopic observations, because of the sky conditions - light pollution and a dusty atmosphere, we often could only see the brightest stars, and sometimes only a few of the first magnitude stars. We could look at double stars and the brighter nebulae and clusters and with the planets that were available during the year (Saturn Jupiter Mars and Venus) so we were kept sufficiently occupied, plus, there is always plenty to talk about. The observations made were recorded in the monthly Newsletter.

In spite of the atmospheric conditions, the Observing Evenings were and still are, useful and fun. They were useful in that newcomers could be shown around the sky in real time and look at and through telescopes and the evenings also lent themselves to informal background discussions and explanations.

2.2 Outreach and Other Events

Presentations to outside organisations are done by the Centre in the interests of the promotion of astronomy. However, the number of activities that were mounted during the year were very few.

- **July 4th -5th 2025 Girl Guides, Johannesburg.**

Johan Smit and Johan Jordaan attended. About 25- 30 attendees.

- **July 26th 2025 ASSA/ESSA**

Johan Smit and Johan Jordaan attended & another centre member attended, as well as Chris Stewart & other Johannesburg Centre Members. About 70+ attendees.

- **July 18th & 19th 2025 Voortrekkers Suider Cross, Zwavelpoort Primary School.**

Danie Barnardo attended. Sixteen children and four adults.

- **August 23rd 2025: Deelfontein**

This was a Centre event.

Bosman Olivier, Frikkie le Roux, Gert van der Westhuizen and Johan Smit attended.

- **August 30th 2025: Johannesburg Girl Guides.**

Johan Smit and Johan Jordaan attended. There were 10-12 girls doing the Astronomy Badge.

Johan Smit gave a talk about SETI

- At the Committee Meeting of July 28th 2025 the Chairman commented that it is now difficult for the Centre to get a team together to do viewing evenings. There are not many people available, and it is generally the same few. Also, a number of members who used to offer their services have moved away. It was agreed that we can no longer commit to offering viewing evenings. For example, if there were at least 100 people at the Zoo and it would be embarrassing if we could only supply two telescopes.

A compromise for schools and groups would be to invite them to our viewing evenings. We could still possibly do events for places with which we have a history.

Two groups who had provisionally requested Observing evenings for September 2025 were advised that we were not able to oblige.

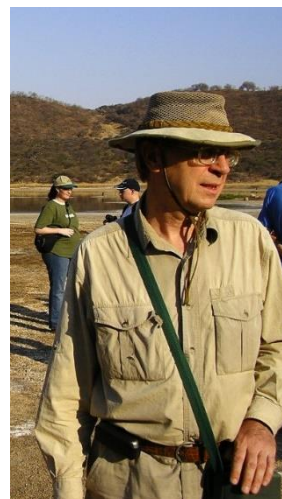
2.3 Website and Social Media: Danie Barnardo.

- The website is functioning very well. It is possible to contact the Committee members via the website, resulting in several queries to Committee members during the year. It is also noticeable that a query about astronomy in Pretoria on Google results in a top listing of the Centre's website.
- Centre meetings are advertised on the website monthly during the year and this feature proved to be very popular.

- A website section to advertise used equipment was also extremely popular and several items were advertised during the year.
- The Archive section of the website contains newsletters as far back as 1988, which provide a history of the Centre and its activities.
- The website consistently attracts in the region of 1,000 hits per month.
- Feedback from visitors to the website frequently attract compliments for its look and feel and general layout.
- The website is hosted by Afrihost, who provides an extremely reliable service.

2.4 Newsletter Editor

- We were sorry to learn that Pierre Lourens had died in September 2025. Pierre had been editing and circulating the newsletter since at least 2003. As a consequence of his death there were no newsletters in August and September while alternative arrangements were being made. Michael Poll took over the newsletter for October and November and subsequently agreed to do it up until the 2026 AGM. Perhaps the AGM will need to discuss a way forward.

- Magda has also continued with her Observers Page and has given details of how-to-find, and descriptions of, Proxima Centauri, NGC 1647, NGC 2516, NGC 3532 and NGC 6093.
- Magda has been sending articles about observing for the Newsletter for more than ten years. She welcomes suggestions about which objects to observe and write articles about but for each month, it must be an object that is visible in the night sky at that time and for the next month.

2.5 Telescope Making Class Johan Smit

- Johan Smit serves as permanent instructor from Pretoria at the class, which has been running for more than 30 years.
- The class still attracts new participants and is still quite busy.
- Attendees are enthusiastic, but sometimes progress is a bit slow, perhaps because it was not realized how much work was involved.

2.6 Curator of instruments: Johan Smit & Johan Jordaan

We have not been using the 12-inch telescope. For practical purposes the telescope is unlikely to be used in the foreseeable future although it can be shown to visitors. Added to this is the fact that we are now holding our observing evenings on the cricket field, so we do not use the sports field where the dome is located.

2.7 Observing (WhatsApp Group) Neville Young:

- The What's App group is very active. A number of people supply images, including Percy Jacobs, Barbara Cunow, Johan Moolman, Dawie Venter, Wessel Nel, Pieter Pienaar and others - apologies to those not mentioned.
- Observations and items of interest are being submitted.

3 CENTRE REPRESENTATIVE

- The Garden Route Centre has closed down, as there was no-one to take over from Case Rijdsdijk. Somone in George has created a Centre that is a What's App group, and which does not hold formal meetings. It was hoped that this is not a sign of things to come.
