XXVII.—OVERMEN.

They shall make examinations of all parts affecting the safety of engaged in the open parts of the mine, and such instructions to work and to stop work as consider necessary to protect the working places of ground, floating shale, or main reef or stone. any case shall cause work to be stopped and the removed from any localities where they have to apprehend any danger from falls; or where consider the danger not imminent, to cause such watch and attention to be given to it as the circumstances reasonably require, and to do all this on the ability of their own judgment without waiting for to that effect from the Inspector of Mines or Manager.

in regard to the working of any hauling gear all also make frequent examinations of same, especially the condition of the standing wires and anchorages, such orders to stop work, or prohibit the use of riding purposes, as in their discretion they find for purposes of safety. They shall also keep a book, in which they shall enter any facts concerning or danger of the mine or any parts of its work- the stops taken to remedy any danger discovered; to be always made available when called for by the Manager of the Company or the Inspector of Mines they shall see that all notices for safety, issued by Inspector of Mines are duly obeyed.

XXVIII.—OVERSEERS.

IT is hereby notified for general information that the Governments of the Cape Colony, Natal, Transvaal, Orange River Colony, Rhodesia, and also the Government of Portuguese East Africa, have all agreed to the adoption of Common Time for Railway, Telegraph and other public purposes in their respective Territories, such time to be that of Meridian of 30 degrees of East Longitude, (that is to say, time two hours fast of Greenwich time).

It has been arranged that this common time shall be brought into general use on the 1st March next, Accordingly at Midnight on the 28th February, 1903, all clocks on the Cape Railway systems and in all Telegraph Offices will be set forward 30 minutes.

The attention of all Local Authorities, Chambers of Commerce, Banking and other Corporations, and of all others having control of public clocks, is drawn to the great convenience which will arise if, on the same day, all public clocks throughout the Colony are also set forward to conform to the new Standard Time.
